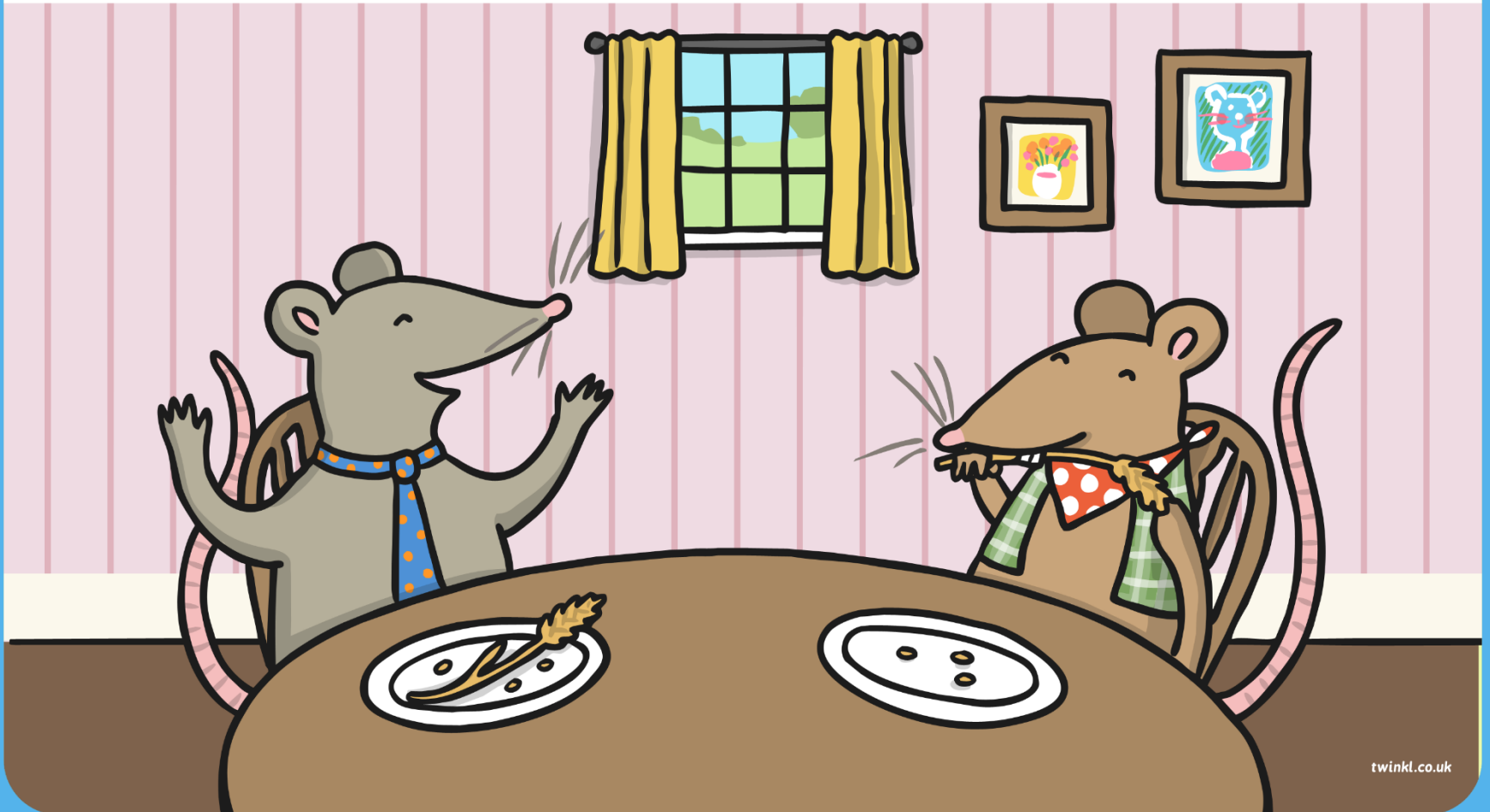
The Town Mouse and the Country Mouse

The country mouse was terrified!



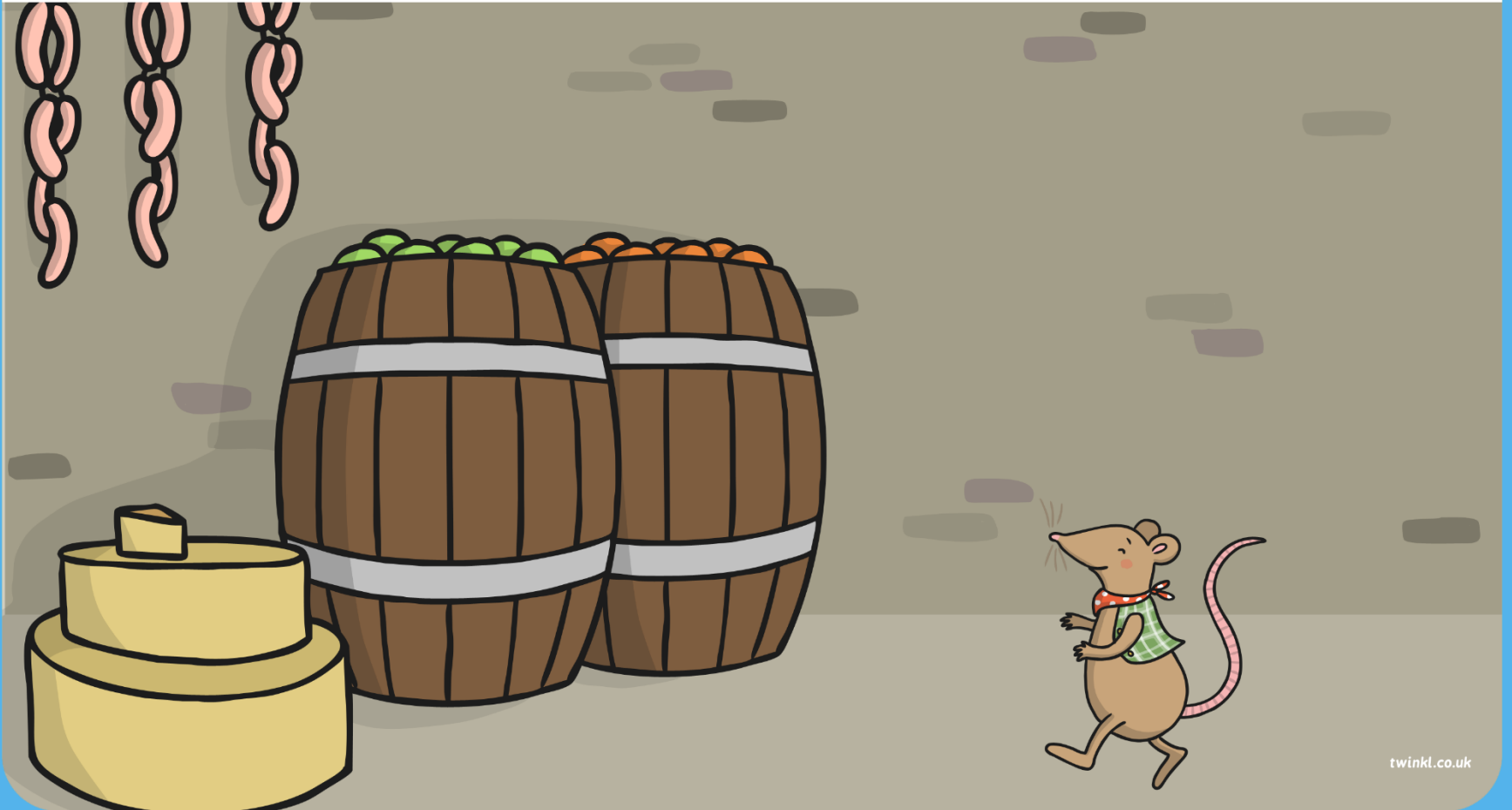

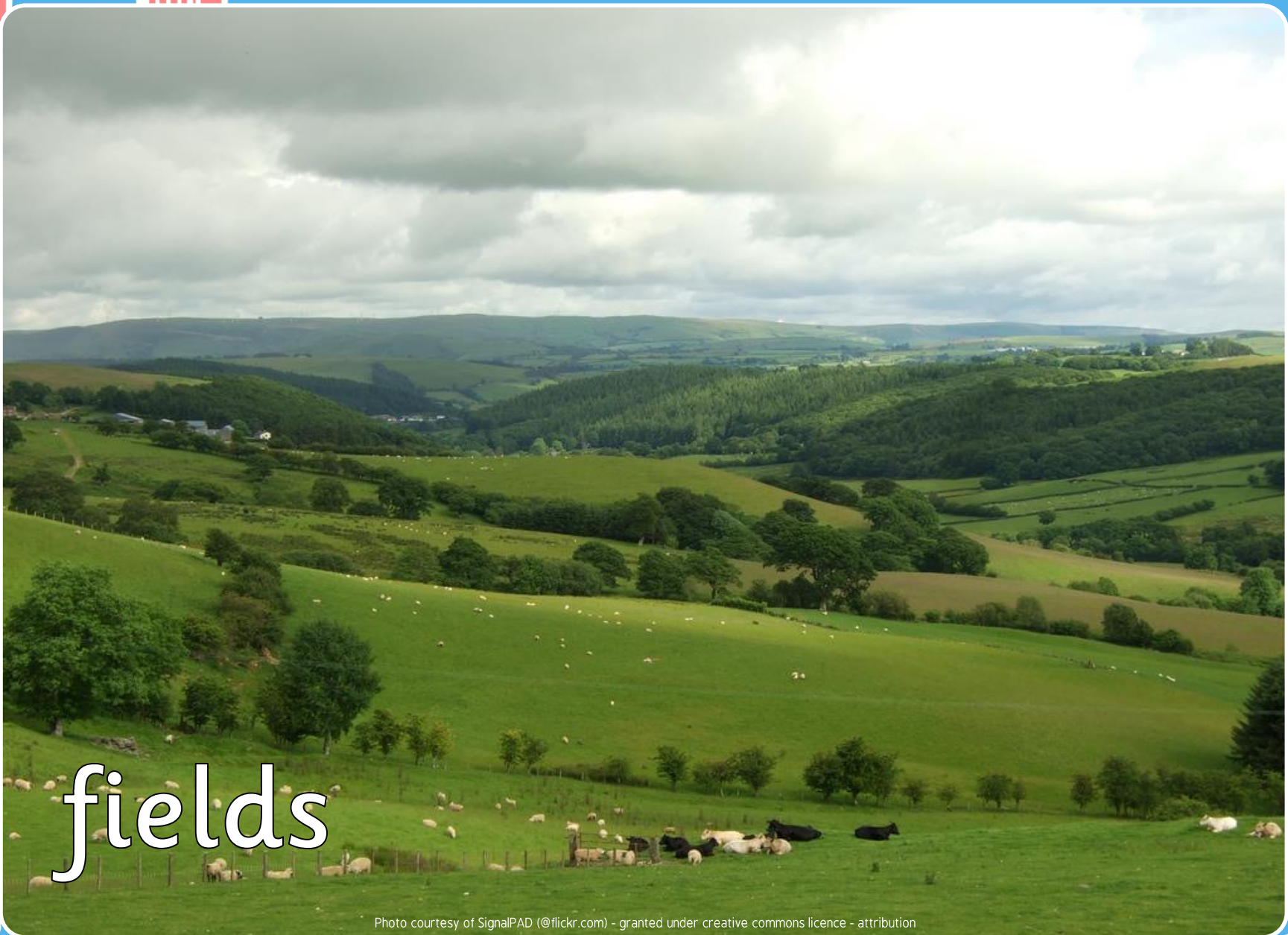

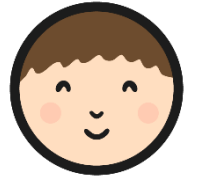
