Dear Parents and Carers.

We would love to see everyone being able to support this event.

On **Sunday 10th March, 10:30am** at St Nicholas Church, we will be holding our Mother's Day service. The children have been working really hard to learn their songs and poems for all the mothers. It is always a lovely service and all the children have a part so it will be lovely to see as many mothers there as possible. There will be tea and biscuits in the church afterwards. Hopefully you will be able to spot the portrait your child has drawn and while in church and read their poems or prayers. Children do not have to wear uniform at this event.

Attendance has had a big part to play in the news this week. Education Secretary, Gillian Keegan announced that fines for persistent absence will increase to £80 per parent rising to £160 if the fine is not paid within 3 weeks. Heads have also been informed that powers to authorise absence will be further streamlined.

Attendance at school is vital. I have written before about the significant correlation between absence and pupil outcomes. Put simply, pupils who miss school regularly reduce their lifetime earning potential because they achieve worse exam results than their peers, and develop poor habits to take to the work place where high levels of absence, poor punctuality, or an indifferent attitude to responsibility can result in dismissal. Positive attendance behaviours need to be embedded at primary school to avoid this.


Attendance every day counts.

WANTED - A Parent Governor

Parent governors play a vital role on governing bodies, holding the unique position of having a parental viewpoint of the school. Through the children,

they have a first hand experience of the delivery of the curriculum, and how the school is perceived from the 'consumers' point of view. This enables parent governors to bring a different perspective to the strategic management of the school.

Safeguarding at St Nicholas – it's everyones responsibility.

Safeguarding is the action that is taken to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm.

Safeguarding means:

- protecting children from abuse and maltreatment
- · preventing harm to children's health or development
- · ensuring children grow up with the provision of safe and effective care
- taking action to enable all children and young people to have the best outcomes.

Child protection is one part of the safeguarding process. It focuses on protecting individual children identified as suffering or likely to suffer significant harm. This includes child protection procedures that detail how to respond to concerns about a child. Safeguarding children and child protection applies to all children up to the age of 18.

'Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility, every day'.

Spotlight on First Day call procedures



If we have not heard from you by 9.30am, the office staff will contact you. If we are unable to contact you, we will start to call all the contact numbers that you have provided in order to gain an explanation for the absence. If we still have not been able to ascertain where your child is, then we may make a home visit. However, if we still have not been able to get a response, consideration will be given as to whether we alert the police to carry out a home welfare check. This procedure is to ensure that we know where your child is and that you are all safe.

Operation Encompass



Our school participates in a national scheme called 'Operation Encompass', which is a joint partnership between Kent Police and schools. One of the principles of Operation Encompass is that all incidents of domestic abuse are shared with schools, not just those where an offence can be identified. This system has been established to help schools provide in-school support to children who have been present at, exposed to or involved in any domestic abuse incident. We know that children can be significantly harmed, physically and/or emotionally, during these situations, and that it also negatively affects their learning and behaviour. Therefore, as part of the Operation Encompass procedure, and to help mitigate the resulting negative impact, the school receives an email from Kent Police the morning after a child has been witness to, or involved in, any reported domestic abuse incident. We are then able to use this information to provide the right support to any child and their family as and when it is needed.

The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 now recognises that children can be victims of domestic abuse through seeing, hearing and experiencing the effects.



Are your contact details up to date?

It is vitally important that if you change your home phone or mobile number; email; address; names of contacts, that you let the school know as soon as possible, so we have the most up-to-date contact details. The school must also have more than one contact in case of an emergency. **Thank you.**

Our Easter Egg raffle starts this week. Raffle tickets are 20p each.


Classes are also being challenged to collect as many 10p's as possible to take part in the coin race which, weather permitting, will be on the last day of term.

body.


















Internet Safety Tips

Learn about it:

Teach your child some simple rules

- Make sure your child knows not to share personal information like their phone number or email address online
- Only talk to real life friends or family if they are on sites with a social media element like Moshi Monsters or Club Penguin
- Use privacy settings wherever they exist to keep their information private
- Be a good online friend and don't say nasty things even if it's just a joke
- Use secure and legal sites to download music and games
- Check attachments and pop ups for viruses before they click or download anything
- Use Public Friendly WiFi when they're out and about to filter inappropriate content

Talk about it:

Tips for a meaningful conversation

- Start conversations when your children won't be embarrassed, for example in the car going home from school
- Ask them for advice on how to do something online and use this as a conversation starter
- Make sure they know they can come to you if they're upset by something they've seen online
- Be sensitive and praise them when they share their online experiences with you
- If your child comes to you with an issue, stay calm and listen without judging them
- Talk about online grooming as you would stranger danger and explain that people they meet online might not be who they say they are
