


Attendance every day counts.

Spotlight on: Child on Child Abuse (formerly known as Peer on Peer Abuse)



What is this type of abuse?

Child-on-child abuse occurs when a child or young person is exploited, bullied and/or harmed by others of the same or similar age. The impact of this behaviour on children can be very distressing and have an impact on academic achievement and emotional health and wellbeing. All staff know what to do if they come across, or are worried about, child-on-child abuse. They are aware of their duty to report this to the DSL or one of the safeguarding team to ensure that children are safe.

<u>Child-on-child abuse is most likely to include, but</u> is not limited to:

- Bullying (including cyber-bullying, prejudice-based and discriminatory bullying)
- Physical abuse such as hitting, kicking, shaking, biting, hair-pulling or otherwise causing
 physical harm (this may include and online element which facilitates threatens and/or
 encourages physical abuse)
- Emotional abuse on or offline
- Abuse in intimate relationships between peers
- Sexual violence and sexual harassment this can occur between two children of any
 age and sex or a group of children sexually assaulting or sexually harassing a single
 child or group of children.
- Causing someone to engage in sexual activity without consent
- Upskirting, which typically involves taking a picture underneath someone's clothing without their permission to obtain sexual gratification or cause the victim humiliation, distress or alarm
- Consensual and non-consensual sharing of nude and semi-nude images and/or videos (also known as sexting or youth produced sexual imagery)
- Initiation/hazing type violence and rituals which could include activities involving
 harassment, abuse or humiliation used as a way of initiating a person in to a group and
 may also include an online element.

Are your contact details up to date?

It is vitally important that if you change your home phone or mobile number; email; address; names of contacts, that you let the school know as soon as possible, so we have the most up-to-date contact details. The school must also have more than one contact in case of an emergency.

Fortnite Battle Royale

Fortnite Battle Royale is rated PEGI 12 because it features moderate violence which means it is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age.

It is important to remember that when rating games, PEGI do not take into consideration the communication features of a game. Fortnite does include a chat facility, which adds further risks.



What is Fortnite?

There are different versions of Fortnite, including Battle Royale, which is free to play (although in-app purchases are available). In Battle Royale up to one hundred players compete against each other.

What do I need to be aware of?

- Chatting to strangers and inappropriate language: Fortnite
 contains voice and text chat. Due to the nature of the game, your child
 may be chatting to strangers and may hear inappropriate language. Ensure
 your child knows how to report players for any inappropriate behaviour.
- In app purchases: All users can purchase V-Bucks directly through the game so make sure you don't store your card details within the game/device and restrict purchases.

Parental Controls

Fortnite includes several parental controls to help you make it a safer environment for your child including disabling voice chat, filtering language and setting privacy settings. Also, remember to set up age-appropriate parental controls on the device your child is playing on.

- Talk to someone you trust like an adult, or you can always talk to a <u>Childline</u> counsellor.
- 2. **Report bullying and abuse** directly to the website or app
- 3. **Delete things you've shared** that you're worried about,or find ways to hide them
- 4. **Tell the police** by making a report to CEOP if someone is threatening or blackmailing you
- 5. **Plan for the future** and change your privacy settings so it doesn't happen again

The most popular are Facebook and Instagram, with many others such as
Snapchat, TikTok and Twitter.

There are lots of benefits to social networking. Children can stay connected to friends and family. They can also learn many different things, from make-up or gaming tutorials to making slime, or how to create their own videos.

Like most things, there can be negatives too. For children and young people there are risks that you should be aware of, to help keep your child safe on social media.
