


Attendance every day counts.


Nicholas Bear was awarded to – EYFS for their wonderful behaviour at The Marsh Sporting event this week. Well Done!


We ask you, to respect those among you and are over you in the Lord, and to esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves.

- Fri 7th Children working with local artist Mrs Munn on book illustrations



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
