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# From the Headteachers desk...

### The Importance of PE in Our School

At our school, Physical Education (PE) is more than just a subject - it is a vital part of our children's overall development. This year, we are incredibly proud to have taken part in 16 competitive sporting events, often entering 2 or 3 teams in each event. This has meant over 300 pupils have had the opportunity to represent our school in these events, and we are delighted to share that every single one of these events have returned medal winners to our school. These successes are a testament not just to talent, but to dedication, teamwork, and resilience.

However, PE at our school goes beyond competition. We have also participated in eight non-competitive events, carefully designed to build children's confidence in sport. These inclusive activities have involved near 180 pupils - many of whom may not have typically taken part in sporting opportunities. This wide participation ensures that all children, regardless of skill level, feel valued and included in our school's sporting culture.

Why is this important? Firstly, these events encourage pupils to be physically active, often through new movements and sustained activity, supporting both physical and mental health. Secondly, through every event - whether competitive or not - our children learn the value of teamwork. They support one another, celebrate together, and learn how to face challenges as a team. And thirdly, these opportunities are fun! They allow children to reconnect with their peers, try new experiences, and enjoy activities often led by our fantastic young leaders.

In our football and rugby tournaments especially, children have had the chance to experience the thrill of competition. It is here they learn something even deeper - how to win with grace and lose with dignity. These may be traditional values, but they are essential. They build character and develop the resilience that we hope our pupils carry with them far beyond their time in primary school.

As we look ahead to an exciting term, our calendar is again full of sporting events, including our much-loved sports days. These whole school events are a celebration of everything we believe in - participation, enjoyment, and personal growth through physical activity. I hope to see many of you there, cheering on our pupils and celebrating the role PE plays in shaping happy, healthy, and confident children at St Nicholas.




### Attendance every day counts.

### Hiding photos, WhatsApp chats and Snapchats

### What is Snapchat My Eyes Only?

Here's a useful tip if you are checking your child's phone for inappropriate content. **Snapchat My Eyes Only** came out in 2016 and is essentially a private, password-protected section of the app where users can store Snaps and Stories

which they wish to keep hidden from others, even if those others (e.g. parents) have access to their phone. It allows users to move selected photos and videos from their main Memories section into a secure, locked folder which then requires a passcode to view.

### What is WhatsApp Locked Chats?

Here's another version of this privacy setting, this time in WhatsApp. WhatsApp has a chat lock feature. It can be fairly obvious if a chat has been hidden because it's stored within a visible **Locked Chats** folder. But, as an extra measure you can hide the Locked Chats folder which is opened by tapping on search, then entering a security key.

### What can I do if I think my child has SEND?

Special educational needs, often referred to as 'SEN' or 'SEND' (Special educational needs and disabilities), is a term used to describe learning difficulties or disabilities that make it harder for a child to learn compared to children of the same age.

All children may experience challenges with their learning at some point and for most children, these difficulties overcome with support from teachers and home. However, children with SEND are likely to need extra or different help to be able to learn.

### How do you know if a child has SEND?

A child or young person has SEN if:

- They have significantly greater difficulty in learning than **the majority** of other children and young people the same age
- They have a disability which prevents or hinders them from making use of facilities of a kind generally provided for others of the same age in mainstream schools or mainstream post-16 provisions

### A child or young person has a disability if:

They have a physical and mental impairment which has a **substantial** and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out day-to-day activities.

### What types of difficulties are SEND?

Children may have difficulties in one or more of these areas:





- Cognition and Learning A child may find all learning difficult or have difficulties with specific activities such as reading or spelling. A child may have trouble understanding instructions and carrying out tasks. A child may have memory difficulties.
- Communication and Interaction A child may have difficulty in talking to others or understanding what others are saying to them. A child may have difficulty with interactions with others, such as not being able to take turns. A child who has speech and language needs will be classed as having communication and interaction needs.
- Physical and Sensory A child may have hearing or vision loss. A child may have difficulty
  with sensory processing, being under or over-sensitive. A child may have a medical condition
  which affects them physically.
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health A child may display behaviours such as having very low self-esteem or being very anxious. A child may display challenging, disruptive or distressing behaviours. A child may have underlying conditions which affect their mental health.
